



COMMISSION FOR SOCIAL JUSTICE HISTORY

The Commission for Social Justice (CSJ) is the anti-defamation branch of the Grand Lodge of New York Order Sons and Daughters of Italy in America. The Commission was formed specifically to undertake the work of combating defamation against Italian Americans and other ethnic groups. The two primary goals of the CSJ are to promote a positive image of Americans of Italian descent and to fight bias, bigotry and defamation aimed at Italian Americans, as well as other groups.

In the early 1960's the National Order Sons of Italy in America initiated The Committee Against Bias, Bigotry and Prejudice. The Grand Venerable of New York, P. Vincent Landi chaired the Committee. He introduced the Committee to the Grand Lodge of New York and served as its president. Judge Angelo Roncallo and Joseph Giordano were succeeding presidents. In 1977 Grand Venerable of New York, Peter R. Zuzolo made a motion to establish permanency of the Committee and change the word Committee to Commission, a word that he believed to be positive and memorable. The motion was approved.

On a National level, The Committee Against Bias, Bigotry and Prejudice was renamed The Institute for Liberty and Justice. On the State level, then Grand Lodge of New York Recording Secretary Joseph Sciame proposed the change to the Commission for Social Justice. The change was adopted at a New York Executive Session in 1980. An official announcement of the new name was made on October 12, 1980. It was at a National CSJ meeting that New York convinced National OSIA to also adopt the name Commission for Social Justice.

Mathew G. Nizza became the first Chairman of the New York State Commission for Social Justice in 1980 and his successors were Joseph Parillo (1985), Vincent Romano (1989), John Dabbene (1993), Sylvia Summa (1999), Santina Haemmerle (2001), Stella Grillo (2005), Enrico J.Annichiarico (2011), Louis J. Gallo (2013). John A. Fratta was appointed Chairman in 2017.

Through the efforts of the New York State Commission for Social Justice and upstate filial Lodges, the New York State Department of Motor Vehicles changed an application form that negatively depicted Italian Americans. In addition to an apology, the Department agreed to void and eliminate certain offensive license plates. Further efforts resulted in the New York State Lottery Commission's removal of an offensive television advertisement (*Bada Bling* lottery tickets) that depicted Italian Americans with a mobster persona. The Lottery Commission discontinued the advertisement and sent a letter of apology. CSJ has had many additional successes in stopping defamatory programs, activities, advertisements, and statements originating from various forms of media, including New York City and State agencies, schools, and private organizations.

The Positive Image Programs developed by the New York State Commission for Social Justice continues to be its hallmark. Some of the positive images produced by the CSJ include bookmarks, book covers, posters, and booklets that illustrate pictures and biographies of prominent Italians and Italian Americans who have made significant contributions to society. Recently created posters depict Italian American *911* First Responders, Crime Fighters, Entertainers, Sports figures, Women, and Writers. The bookmarks and posters are an excellent educational tool for elementary students. A Positive Image film library and the Holocaust Memorial Program have also been developed.

The New York State Commission for Social Justice has produced special programs and distributed and published a number of them such as *Una Storia Segreta, The Mario Lanza Program, The Joe DiMaggio Show, The Rocky Marciano Show, Columbus Day Programs* and the very successful *Italian American Recipients* of *the Congressional Medal of Honor Program.* This program resulted in a documentary video that has been widely distributed throughout the country. In May 2004 the *Medal of Honor* video won the prestigious Telly Award. CSJ, together with the NYS Grand Lodge Foundation, Inc., recently supported the production of a documentary entitled *Men of Vision: the Story of Giuseppe Garibaldi and Antonio Meucci.* Thanks to New York State CSJ Executive Board member Vincent Marmorale, the documentary *My Italian Secret* - The Forgotten Heroes of the Holocaust was completed and he has

prepared a companion lesson plan that is available to OSDIA Lodges as well as local schools.

Relative to schools, presentations to students on Italian language and culture have been made to Westhampton Beach Middle School, Parkway Elementary School in East Meadow, Lawrence School District on Long Island, and St. Claire's Elementary School on Staten Island. In fact, monies from CSJ have been extended to St. Claire in an effort to sustain their Italian Language Studies Program. CSJ continues to monitor the success of these programs and has been very successful in stifling attempts to cut Italian Language Studies Programs in the North Shore School District on Long Island, and in the Greece Central School District in Rochester. Past CSJ Chairman Louis Gallo's famed *History in a Box Program* has been presented to numerous middle and high schools throughout New York.

The New York State Commission for Social Justice is also at the forefront of halting burgeoning attempts to distort the legacy of Christopher Columbus. These distortions are being met head on by CSJ through press conferences, rallies, social media, letter and telephone call campaigns to local elected officials across the State of New York. A well-balanced and fair presentation in the form of a document entitled *Columbus: Fact Vs Fiction* was produced at the National level in order to educate detractors of Christopher Columbus.

The New York State Commission for Social Justice joined forces with over fifty other Italian American organizations in New York to fight any attempt to remove Columbus statues. The CSJ along with the Columbus Citizens Foundation, the Italian American Museum, and the Italian Legal Defense and Higher Education Fund are the four major groups leading the fight. The effort resulted in the October 8, 2018 announcement by New York Governor Andrew M. Cuomo that the New York State Board for Historic Preservation has listed New York City's monument to Christopher Columbus on the State Register of Historic Places.

The statue was listed on the State Register of Historic Places after a unanimous vote of the State Board for Historic Preservation on September 20, 2018. A listing on the State Register of Historic Places is a significant designation because it indicates the importance of the statue in New York State's history. Immediately after adding the statue to the State Register, State Parks forwarded a nomination of the statue to the National Park Service for listing on the National Register of Historic Places. This would be an honored recognition of historic significance and offers protection for the statue under state and federal historic preservation laws. National Register listing would also make the statue eligible for state and federal grant programs.

New channels are being forged with other Italian organizations and ethnic groups to build a solid front in protecting against bias and stereotyping and in promoting our respective cultures. These organizations are the American Association of Teachers of Italian – Long Island (AATI-LI), Arba Sicula (Sicilian Dawn), which promotes the Sicilian language, literature & history, and B'nai B'rith along with its CSJ counterpart the ADL (Anti- Defamation League).

The New York State Commission for Social Justice is also committed to creating a very strong statewide organization at the grassroots level so as to extend the mission of CSJ directly to local communities. In that regard, visits are made and SKYPE technology is used at the level where District Chairpersons and Lodge Liaisons are encouraged to fulfill our mission and to engage in public relations with local print media.

The work of the New York State Commission for Social Justice continues and we thank our supporters for their steadfast encouragement and confidence in our mission.

CHRISTOPHER COLUMBUS CHANGED HISTORY 527 YEARS AGO

Cristoforo Colombo (better known as Christopher Columbus) was born the son of a wool merchant on October 31, 1451 in the Northern Italian town of Genoa. He was an explorer, navigator, colonizer, and citizen of the Republic of Genoa. He is popular because he was the explorer who tried to prove that the world was round by sailing across the seas and trying to reach other, unexplored regions on the globe, eventually making a mistake that would mark the beginning of a civilization and soon after, a new country.

Before setting sail 527 years ago, Columbus faced many obstacles but persevered. His request for funds was rejected by the King of Portugal and King of England before Ferdinand and Isabella, the King and Queen of Spain, granted him necessary funding to find a Western route to the Orient on August 3, 1492. Between 1492 and 1504, Columbus made four different transatlantic voyages. His voyages were not without struggles but he overcame storms, disease, and hostile natives to become one of the greatest navigators and explorers of all time.



ACCOMPLISHMENTS:

Though he is credited with discovering the Americas, Christopher Columbus was not the first European to make a transatlantic voyage. Evidence exists that Viking Leif Eriksson may have made the journey from Europe to North America five centuries before Columbus' discovery of the continent however, it was the "discovery" of the New World by Christopher Columbus that changed the history of the world.

Columbus was the first European to reach the New World in circumstances that allowed for major European colonization to begin. This eventually ended up allowing the United States to be created. The creation of the United States helped, among other things, to move much of the world towards democracy. It also led to the development of what is now a world superpower. He not only ultimately caused the founding of the United States, but also shaped Mexico, Canada, and many Caribbean and South American nations. His voyages led to others exploring and reshaped the world.

In addition, history was changed by the exchange of plants and animals between Europe and the Americas, commonly known as the Columbian Exchange. Tomatoes, potatoes, and corn previously unknown in Europe became an important part of the diet of people living there. Similarly, cattle, sheep, and hogs were introduced into the Americas. So it was not the "discovery" that mattered as much as the colonization. Simply said, Columbus' "discovery" of America changed history.

LATER YEARS

Columbus settled in *Valladolid*, a small town in central Spain, and it was said that he became a very religious man in his later years. He published books containing the fruits of his expeditions. The first was the *Book of Privileges*, an account of the benefits and rewards he was entitled to from his deal with the Spanish Crown. The second, the *Book of the Prophecies*, was more religious in nature, where he used several scriptures from the Bible to claim that his achievements were part of God's plan in the history of salvation.

On May 20, 1506, Columbus died of a heart attack due to arthritis (as claimed by researchers in 2003), in Valladolid, Spain. He was then buried in the La Cartuja monastery in Seville. At that time, he was known as one of the richest voyagers in Spain due to the massive amounts of gold that he was able to acquire.

In 2016, the National Education Association issued a press release encouraging school districts nationwide to celebrate the second Monday in October as "Indigenous Peoples' Day" on the same day of the traditional federal holiday, Columbus Day. It also stated it would provide access to funds in order to accomplish this mission. Many Americans, especially Italian Americans, have protested this action. If it is run simultaneously or as a substitute for Columbus Day, it is obvious that the legacy of Columbus will be pushed aside with the eventual intent to merely ignore Columbus.

Columbus Day has been celebrated in this Country since Tammany Hall introduced it in New York City in 1792 and officially recognized it as a Federal Holiday when President Franklin D. Roosevelt signed it into law in 1937. Columbus is as Americana as any other component of our culture we deem America.

The NYS Commission for Social Justice (CSJ) has been at the forefront of phone call and letter writing campaigns throughout the Country that have delayed or stopped this attempt. While we have been successful in San Diego and Colorado, the campaign to get rid of Columbus Day continues and New York State is the next target. Already, the CSJ has delayed a change in some of the school districts in upstate New York and will continue its fight to preserve the memory of Christopher Columbus and his play in the history of the Americas. We believe in diversity and tolerance by ADDITION, not by SUBTRACTION or SUBSTITUTION.

Carol has written many books, her latest is *Columbus and the Quest for Jerusalem*.

Since 1972, he has been the spiritual leader of Congregation Mount Sinai in Brooklyn. Rabbi Potasnik is the co-host along with Reverend A.R. Italian Immigration to the United States



"Today I have a dream and hope that someday, even if it takes one hundred years before we are fully accepted, our children and their children's children, even if they carry a single drop of Italian blood, will be able and proud to continue to carry on our traditions, our culture and our language. It is up to us, and what we do today."

Dr.Vincenzo Sellaro June 5, 1905

Italian Americans are the fourth largest census reported European ethnic group in the United States. About 5.5 million Italians immigrated to the United States from 1820 to 2004. Approximately 84% of the Italian immigrants came from the former Kingdom of the Two Sicilies.

After the 1861 unification, the Italian government initially encouraged emigration to relieve economic pressures in the south. After the American Civil War, which resulted in over ½ million killed or wounded, immigrant workers were recruited from Italy and elsewhere to fill the labor shortage caused by the war.

In the United States, most Italians began their new lives as manual laborers in eastern city mining camps and in agriculture. The descendants of the Italian immigrants gradually rose from a lower economic class (1890's-1920's) to a national average by 1970 and by 1990, more than 65% of the descendants were managerial, professional or white-collar workers.

Little Italies were, to a considerable extent, the result of "Italophobia". The ethnocentrism and anti-Catholicism exhibited by the earlier Anglo-Saxon and northern European settlers helped to create an ideological foundation for fixing foreignness on urban spaces occupied by immigrants. Communities of Italians were established in most major industrial cities of the early 20th century. Those cities included, Baltimore, Maryland; New York City, New York; Newark, New Jersey; Boston, Massachusetts; Philadelphia, Pennsylvania; Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania; Hartford, Connecticut; Providence, Rhode Island; St. Louis, Missouri; Chicago, Illinois; Cleveland, Ohio; Buffalo, New York; Kansas City, Missouri.

New Orleans, Louisiana was the first site of immigration of Italians and Sicilians into America in the 19th Century, before Italy was a unified nation-state. This was before New York Harbor and Baltimore became the preferred destinations of Italian immigrants. The state of California has had Italian American residents since the 1850's.

Today, New York and New Jersey have the largest number of Italian Americans in the United States, while smaller northeastern cities such as Pittsburgh, Providence, and Hartford have the highest percentage of Italian Americans in their metropolitan areas.

Grandniece of OSIA Founder, Dr. Vincenzo Sellaro

Carol Sorace Whalen was born in Brooklyn, raised her family in Queens, and now lives in Garden City. She attended Catholic schools and graduated from Newton College of the Sacred Heart in Massachusetts. She received her masters degree from Boston University and her doctorate from Hofstra University. Carol enjoyed a long and meaningful career working with deaf children and adults. She taught at Adelphi University training teachers of the deaf, and at the Lexington School for the Deaf as an educator and administrator. Finally, she worked as an educational consultant in the Cochlear Implant Programs at several hospitals in Manhattan and Long Jeland Carol retired from her professio



hospitals in Manhattan and Long Island. Carol retired from her professional career in 2011.

Volunteer work has become a major part of Carol's life. She counsels and assists homeless persons at the INN in Hempstead. She serves on the advisory board of the New Ground organization, which strives to assist homeless veterans and their families through counseling and financial education. Carol also volunteers and raises funds for the Lustgarten Foundation for Pancreatic Cancer Research. She is a member of the Parish Social Ministry Advisory Board at the Church of St. Anne in Garden City. Carol has been a member of the America Lodge #2245 since 2005, in which she has held the positions of Recording Secretary, Chairperson of the Italian Language and Scholarship Award Program, Trustee, and Fashion Show Mistress of Ceremonies.

Dr. Vincenzo Sellaro, a passionate visionary for his time and for the present, was Carol's granduncle. His younger brother, Salvatore, was her maternal grandfather. Dr. Sellaro's daughter, Cecilia, and Carol's mother, Serafina, were close first cousins. In 1980, Carol's mother addressed the 75th anniversary celebration of the founding of the Order of the Sons of Italy in America at the Halloran House in Manhattan, since Cecilia was too shy to speak in public. Serafina spoke of her uncle's achievements in helping Italian immigrants adjust to life in a new city and country. In 2005 Carol and her sister, Rosemarie Nicolais, were honored to be OSIA guests at the 100th anniversary celebration of the Order's founding. Carol and Rosemarie are especially proud of providing two photographs of Maria Lignante, Dr. Sellaro's wife and First Lady of the Order.

Carol's enthusiasm for family history and her pride in her Italian heritage drew her to Polizzi Generosa, Sicily, where she found two houses in which Dr. Sellaro and his siblings lived; the church where they were baptized; their birth records; and a small square named Largo Sellaro only steps away from the family homes. Family lore held that there was an influential 19th century bishop in the Sellaro family, which may help to explain Largo Sellaro. It was this bishop who, it was said, provided the means for Dr. Sellaro to complete his medical school education in Naples.

Family is the most important part of Carol's life. She and her husband, Thomas, were married for 46 years before his death. They had two beloved children, their son, Marc, and Jennifer, their daughter, who predeceased her father. Carol has two wonderful granddaughters, Maya and Olivia, who are Jennifer's children.

Carol is grateful to the New York State Grand Lodge Committee for Social Justice for the honor bestowed on her today. She remains committed to promoting a positive image of Italian-Americans in America and beyond.





HONOREE Carol Delaney, PbD

Cultural Anthropologist noted for Positive Work on Christopher Columbus

Carol Lowery Delaney earned an A.B. in philosophy at Boston University, 1962. After a ten year hiatus, she entered Harvard Divinity School and received an M.T.S. 1976, and went on to the University of Chicago for a PhD in cultural anthropology, 1984.

Her anthropological fieldwork was conducted in Turkey, 1979-82, two years of which were spent in a relatively remote mountain village. She won the Galler prize for the most distinguished dissertation in the Division of the Social Sciences at the University

of Chicago. That dissertation was transformed into a book, The Seed and Soil; Gender and Cosmology in Turkish Village Society.

After spending a year in Belgium on a Fulbright Fellowship conducting research among immigrant Turks, she returned to Harvard where she became Assistant Director of the Center for the Study of World Religions, 1985-87, and taught several courses at the Divinity School.

She taught at Stanford University in the Department of Cultural and Social Anthropology from 1987-2006, now emerita. One popular course, Investigating Culture, became the basis for an innovative textbook, Investigating Culture: An Experiential Introduction to Anthropology, third edition.

While at Stanford she wrote Abraham on Trial. The Social Legacy of Biblical Myth, which was finalist for the National Jewish Book Award (category scholarship) and special mention for the Victor Turner Prize of the Society for Humanistic Anthropology. It was also the inspiration for an opera of the same title, composed by Andrew Lovett, and has its world premier in England, 2005.

Her latest book is Columbus and the Quest for Jerusalem. She writes that she had not thought much about Columbus until the fall of 1999 when she was teaching a course called "Millennial Fever" intended to observe the frenzy gripping the United States over the turn of the millennium and to study the history of apocalyptic, millennial thinking. In one of the readings, she came across a reference to Columbus's apocalyptic, millennial beliefs. Neither she nor any of her colleagues had ever heard of them. This drew her to the John Carter Brown Library at Brown University where she spent the summer of 2003 and then returned with the NEH fellowship in 2004-05. Her research was so compelling that she decided to retire from Stanford in order to work on her book about Columbus. For two years, she also taught half time in Religious Studies Department at Brown.

In addition to numerous articles and invited lectures she has also had, as of this date, 48 letters published in the New York Times, and others in the San Francisco Chronicle, Wall Street Journal, Providence Journal, Harvard Magazine, and Harper's.

In the spring of 2014 she walked more than 500 miles on the Camino de Santiago in northern Spain and walked 280 miles in the spring of 2015. She walked the Coast to Coast path across England with her brother in May 2016. Carol volunteered at a hostel on the Camino de Santiago and then walked with her brother from Leon to Santiago in Sept. - Oct. 2017.



HONOREE Rabbi Joseph Potasnik

Radio Show Host and Champion for Social Justice

Rabbi Potasnik is the Executive Vice President of The New York Board of Rabbis, the largest interdenominational rabbinic body in the world. Since 1972, he has been the spiritual and educational leader of Congregation Mount Sinai in Brooklyn Heights, New York. He is presently Rabbi Emeritus. He has served as Chaplain of the New York City




Fire Department since 1999. Rabbi Potasnik maintained a high profile, helping many families cope with the disaster of September 11th, 2001.

Rabbi Potasnik is the co-host along with Reverend A.R. Bernard of "The Rev and The Rabbi" which airs every Sunday morning on WABC Talk Radio, 770 AM, at 8 am. Rabbi is the religious commentator for 1010 WINS Radio, succeeding the late Rabbi Marc Tannenbaum. He is the host of the TV program *Faith to Faith* on Jewish Broadcasting Service ("JBS"), which is seen around the country and invites people of all faiths to participate in meaningful conversation. He is also a member of the Board of Directors for the Archbishop Fulton J. Sheen Center for Thought & Culture.

He was appointed by Mayor Rudolph Giuliani and reappointed by Mayor Michael Bloomberg to the New York City Campaign Finance Board. He also served as a member of the New York Human Rights Commission, and Chaplain of the New York Press Club. Rabbi Potasnik was awarded the Jan Karski Humanitarian Award 2014 by the Polish Consulate, named in honor of a Polish patriot, a Catholic, and hero of the Polish Resistance. He also received the Ellis Island Medal of Honor in 2014.

Rabbi Potasnik has published numerous articles in local Brooklyn newspapers, assorted Jewish newspapers and the New York Post. He also authored the Forward for "The Illustrated Jewish Bible for Children". He is completing a new book, *"Just Give Me a Minute"* which will contain many of his featured commentaries on 1010WINS. In 2013, he was selected by the Forward Newspaper as one of the 50 most inspiring Rabbis.


